There is a good supply of vegetables, fruits and breads, thanks to the many grocery stores who support the food bank. However, there are fewer boxes of staples, like beans, soup, peanut butter, crackers, tuna fish. - Loaves & Fishes Community Food Bank uses a food recovery model ensuring that good quality food reaches those who need it, rather than being wasted. With this approach, the food bank can provide more than \$5 in good quality food for every \$1 of donated funds.





In recognition of National Day for Truth & Reconciliation, commonly referred to as "Orange Shirt Day", you are encouraged to wear Orange to our Worship Service on Sunday, September 28<sup>th</sup>. This day, recognized each year on Sept. 30<sup>th</sup>, has become a poignant occasion across Canada, inviting reflection, education, and action in the ongoing journey toward truth and reconciliation. Schools, public service organizations, and faith communities—including Hope—wear orange shirts to recognize the history of Indigenous children who were forced to attend government residential schools away from their families beginning at ages 5 or 6, and to acknowledge the principle that "every child matters."

Orange T-shirts are now available at Snaw-Naw-As (Nanoose) Shell station and Market on the Island Highway, at Walmart (Woodgrove), and at Thrifty Foods and London Drugs.


