Children's Corner

<u>First Reading</u> – Ezekiel 37:1-14

The hand of the Lord came upon me, and he brought me out by the spirit of the Lord and set me down in the middle of a valley; it was full of bones. He led me all around them; there were very many lying in the valley, and they were very dry. He said to me, "Mortal, can these bones live?" I answered, "O Lord God, you know." Then he said to me, "Prophesy to these bones, and say to them: O dry bones, hear the word of the Lord. Thus says the Lord God to these bones: I will cause breath to enter you, and you shall live. 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Second Reading – Romans 8:6-11

To set the mind on the flesh is death, but to set the mind on the Spirit is life and peace. For this reason the mind that is set on the flesh is hostile to God; it does not submit to God's law—indeed it cannot, and those who are in the flesh cannot please God. But you are not in the flesh; you are in the Spirit, since the Spirit of God dwells in you. Anyone who does not have the Spirit of Christ does not belong to him. But if Christ is in you, though the body is dead because of sin, the Spirit is life because of righteousness. If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies also through his Spirit that dwells in you. Word of God, word of life.

Gospel – **John 11:1-45**

The Holy Gospel according to John.

Glory to you, O Lord.

Now a certain man was ill, Lazarus of Bethany, the village of Mary and her sister Martha. Mary was the one who anointed the Lord with perfume and wiped his feet with her hair; her brother Lazarus was ill. So the sisters sent a message to Jesus, "Lord, he whom you love is ill." But when Jesus heard it, he said, "This illness does not lead to death; rather it is for God's glory, so that the Son of God may be glorified through it." Accordingly, though Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus, after having heard that Lazarus was ill, he stayed two days longer in the place where he was. Then after this he said to the disciples, "Let us go to Judea again." The disciples said to him, "Rabbi, the Jews were just now trying to stone you, and are you going there again?" Jesus answered, "Are there not twelve hours of daylight? Those who walk during the day do not stumble, because

they see the light of this world. But those who walk at night stumble, because the light is not in them." After saying this, he told them, "Our friend Lazarus has fallen asleep, but I am going there to awaken him." The disciples said to him, "Lord, if he has fallen asleep, he will be all right." Jesus, however, had been speaking about his death, but they thought that he was referring merely to sleep. Then Jesus told them plainly, "Lazarus is dead. For your sake I am glad I was not there, so that you may believe. But let us go to him." Thomas, who was called the Twin, said to his fellow disciples, "Let us also go, that we may die with him."

When Jesus arrived, he found that Lazarus had already been in the tomb four days. Now Bethany was near Jerusalem, some two miles away, and many of the Jews had come to Martha and Mary to console them about their brother. When Martha heard that Jesus was coming, she went and met him, while Mary stayed at home. Martha said to Jesus, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died. But even now I know that God will give you whatever you ask of him." Jesus said to her, "Your brother will rise again." Martha said to him, "I know that he will rise again in the resurrection on the last day." Jesus said to her, "I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?" She said to him, "Yes, Lord, I believe that you are the Messiah, the Son of God, the one coming into the world." When she had said this, she went back and called her sister Mary, and told her privately, "The Teacher is here and is calling for you." And when she heard it, she got up quickly and went to him. Now Jesus had not yet come to the village, but was still at the place where Martha had met him. The Jews who were with her in the house, consoling her, saw Mary get up quickly and go out. They followed her because they thought that she was going to the tomb to weep there. When Mary came where Jesus was and saw him, she knelt at his feet and said to him, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died."

When Jesus saw her weeping, and the Jews who came with her also weeping, he was greatly disturbed in spirit and deeply moved. He said, "Where have you laid him?" They said to him, "Lord, come and see." Jesus began to weep. So the Jews said, "See how he loved him!" But some of them said, "Could not he who opened the eyes of the blind man have kept this man from dying?" Then Jesus, again greatly disturbed, came to the tomb. It was a cave, and a stone was lying against it. Jesus said, "Take away the stone." Martha, the sister of the dead man, said to him, "Lord, already there is a stench because he has been dead four days." Jesus said to her, "Did I not tell you that if you believed, you would see the glory of God?" So they took away the stone. And Jesus looked upward and said, "Father, I thank you for having heard me. I knew that you always hear me, but I have said this for the sake of the crowd standing here, so that they may believe that you sent me." When he had said this, he cried with a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!" The dead man came out, his hands and feet bound with strips of cloth, and his face wrapped in a cloth. Jesus said to them, "Unbind him, and let him go."

Many of the Jews therefore, who had come with Mary and had seen what Jesus did, believed in him

The Gospel of the Lord.

Praise to you, O Christ.

Sermon John 11:1-45



Someone told me one time, "No one ever died in the presence of Jesus." From the stories that we know, I think they were right. I can't recall anyone in the Gospels who died in his presence. Even the thieves on the cross were alive when Jesus died. Like Lazarus, many people woke up from death in these stories but no one ever died in his presence.

Jesus said, "I am the resurrection and the life," which suggests that where he and his friends go, new life follows. Somewhere along the way, faith will take us through a cemetery and most of us already have experienced that. Our story today tells us that life can return in crisis, because Christ meets us when we are helpless, where there is pain, and when it is dark. His friends know about that, and you are among them.

He stayed two days longer

Jesus had friends. They spent time with him and they got to know each other. Although often with a crowd, sometimes he just needed to be with his friends. With friends you can let your guard down, you can say it like it is, you feel safe, and maybe even shed a tear or two.

After healing the blind man last week, authorities began gathering rocks to stone Jesus. He escaped probably with the help of friends and went to the place where John had baptized him. He went "back to the water." He spoke about water with Nicodemus; had the living water discussion with the woman at the well; and sent a blind man to the pool of Siloam. So Jesus retreated to what happened at the water. Promises at the water remind us that God is with us.

Then he received a message from Mary and Martha that Lazarus was very sick. Wouldn't you do your best to attend the bedside of a dear friend? Why the delay Jesus?

What does it mean to be God's friend? Martha and Mary discovered that God's timing is not the same as ours; life still carries grieving and lament; and yet God is present. The disciples were always learning that God's friends serve others; and

sometimes needed to do what felt risky. Thomas put it well when he said, "Let us go that we may die with him." Friends stick with you.

St. Paul put it most clearly: *nothing can separate us from the love of Christ.... Not life, not death, not anything else.* That is a resilient friendship.

If you had been here

After a few days, they travelled to Bethany, not far from where some wanted to stone him earlier. Martha met Jesus with her grief, and he tried to help her understand hope in the present, not just at some distant last day. Faith is for now.

We will confess the words of the ancient *Apostles' Creed* in a few minutes. Those words have helped people speak of their faith for centuries. Creedal forms focus on what we profess: what was, what will be and. Martha gave assent to the resurrection of the dead. I see Jesus smile, take her face in his hands, and look deeply into her eyes as he says, "I am the resurrection and the life." It was a "right now" assurance for Martha and the rest of us.

Some years ago, a man was so restless while dying at the hospital, that his daughter called the nurse who contacted me as the chaplain on call. I spoke briefly with the distraught daughter before entering the room. Her dad was very afraid and repeated in little breaths, "Help me!" It was a terrible moment. I moved around the bed and into his field of vision for eye contact. I said, "You are deeply loved by God, nothing can separate you from God's love. God is already caring for you. You are God's dear child." He blinked and settled down. I turned to the woman and she said, "Thank you. I think you just saved me years of therapy." We need to know God is present. Jesus shows us that present faith is our foundation.

The other sister, Mary, was full of sadness because Jesus delayed and did not do as she had hoped. It is hard to be in situations where disappointment is the primary feeling. We know about this. All the weeping portrayed the hold that death and despair had on people. Jesus came into that pain which broke his heart as tears of frustration formed. God cares, but life carries the need to face death.

Take away the stone... unbind him... let him go

It is such an enemy. Death takes people away and can feel shattering. But the message of the Gospel is that it cannot exclude us from the love of God. I often encourage family members to write memories, tell stories, remember the good times, or work on a life display for a memorial service. Jesus asked those present to move the stone. WE are called to move barriers away from others as we follow Christ. In

this story, a warm light entered the darkness as Jesus called Lazarus' name, and the power of death gave way. It was a preview of Easter.

His community of friends were asked to unbind Lazarus and let him go. Together they stepped forward, reached, touched, helped, and encouraged. We are involved today in restoring people today too. There are steps² we can take:

- We open arms to those who hurt.
- We wait and see if they will move toward us.
- We offer embrace with the grace of God.
- And then we open our arms again and let them go (inclusion with freedom).

Friends support life: food, quilts, clothes after jail, a coffee, time, a smile, kindness, a listening ear. Friends are there whatever happens — like Jesus for us.

Friends bring life even when there is sadness and sorrow on the road. The grave is not a barrier for us. Death is not the end. Life can still continue right now, because Jesus and his friends are here. Wherever they go, life follows, and you are among them. **Amen.**
